



The last three months have been busy ones for me. As well as chairing the HS2 committee I have worked hard for the people of Poole with a packed programme of regular visits and constituency surgeries. This newsletter presents a few highlights, as well as other local news.

First I would like to say a few words about the national scene. Following our victory in the general election, we will carry on governing the country in accordance with a coherent and proven plan and do our best to support hard working families. Sadly, the Labour party has gone from bad to much, much worse. No responsible voter would wish to elect them into office now they have elected a leader who is well to the left of most of his party colleagues, let alone most people in Poole.

The next big event on the political horizon is the British referendum on whether or not to leave the European Union. Recent events in Europe, in particular the chaotic responses to the Syrian refugee crisis, present a dismaying spectacle. I for one am glad that as a last resort we still have the English Channel. But I will study the detailed outcome of the negotiations before deciding how to vote.

I have considered how Britain should respond to the threat posed by ISIL in Iraq and Syria. The November attacks in Paris show clearly that none of us are safe from these murderous thugs and that the sooner we get rid of them the better. For that reason I voted for an extension of RAF air strikes from Iraq into Syria too. We must act in concert with our friends and allies to defeat ISIL.

On a cheerier note, I am delighted that our economy is continuing to outperform all the other major economies in the developed world. We can look forward to being strong again as a nation. All of us will benefit from the increased economic security as well as military security that look likely as long as Conservatives are in power.

Poole talks with Bournemouth



Possible Creation of Combined Unitary Authority

Public interest has combined with media coverage to raise some controversy on plans to consider the creation of a unified authority for the metropolitan area including Poole and Bournemouth.

Poole Council discussed in full council a motion to clarify the current position and direction of travel relating to this matter. Both the Conservative party and PPP voted in favour.

Poole Council has not agreed to go ahead with the creation of a combined unitary authority. It has simply confirmed a wish to explore the possible business case. Before any decision is taken there will be appropriate consultation.

Former Mayor Peter Adams put the following motion to council:

- Council notes that the Leaders of Poole, Bournemouth, Christchurch and East Dorset Councils have jointly agreed to explore the creation of a unitary authority covering the present boundaries of the four authorities from April 2019.
- Council notes that up to 1 April 1997 Poole had a District Council with limited powers and was part of Dorset CC.
- Councill resolves that before a decision is taken a detailed business case must be made and unless it is advantageous to the Borough of Poole it will not be proceeded with.
- Council resolves that prior to a Council decision and following a satisfactory business case full scrutiny and a suitable consultation is carried out.
- Council is resolved to preserve Poole's heritage and customs and to honour its unique history.

The motion was passed.

As soon as we have more information on all this, we will inform you and offer you a survey to let you have your say.


